A New Year, A New Kind of Resolution

In Ladies Bible Study, we talked about choosing a scripture to guide us into the New Year—almost like a spiritual resolution. One of the passages we read was Numbers 12:1 about Miriam and her anger and jealousy, how it rose up against Moses. That scripture unsettled me a bit, because it made me wonder if I ever carry those same attitudes in my own heart. Do I sometimes feel like I deserve more? Do I let pride or comparison slip in without noticing? Am I not as humble as Moses was?

Every New Year, I tend to circle back to the same resolutions: lose weight, save more money, get more organized... the usual list we all know too well. But as I sat with that scripture, I realized something. Maybe the resolutions I've been choosing all these years aren't the ones that truly shape my heart. Maybe the real work God wants to do in me has nothing to do with my scale or my bank account, and everything to do with my spirit.

That's why I think Lynda had a wonderful idea—choosing a verse as our “resolution.” A scripture that doesn't just challenge us, but transforms us. A scripture that calls us to grow in humility, grace, patience, or trust. A scripture that reminds us who we want to be in Christ, not just what we want to accomplish. Because at the end of the day, being a good Christian isn't about achieving goals—it's about becoming more like Jesus and that happens one surrendered moment at a time.

Maybe this year, instead of striving for perfection, I can strive for a softer heart. Instead of chasing accomplishments, I can chase God's presence. Instead of focusing on what I lack, I can focus on what He is forming in me.

And maybe—just maybe—that will be the most meaningful resolution I've ever made.

30 Sayings of the Wise – Proverbs 22:17-27

I have an app on my phone called *Holy Bible*, and each day it sends me a scripture for reflection. This morning's verse was Proverbs 22:4, a reminder about humility and reverence for God. As I continued reading the chapter, I came across the section titled *Thirty Sayings of the Wise*.

Many of you have read these before—some may have even studied or memorized them—but I thought they would make a wonderful addition to our newsletter each month. We could highlight a few of these sayings as a simple reminder of the Lord's wisdom and guidance. So here are a few to start:

Saying 1

¹⁷ Pay attention and turn your ear to the sayings of the wise;
apply your heart to what I teach,

¹⁸ for it is pleasing when you keep them in your heart
and have all of them ready on your lips.

¹⁹ So that your trust may be in the LORD,
I teach you today, even you.

²⁰ Have I not written thirty sayings for you,
sayings of counsel and knowledge,

²¹ teaching you to be honest and to speak the truth,
so that you bring back truthful reports
to those you serve?

Saying 2

²² Do not exploit the poor because they are poor
and do not crush the needy in court,

²³ for the LORD will take up their case
and will exact life for life.

Saying 3


²⁴ Do not make friends with a hot-tempered person,
do not associate with one easily angered,

²⁵ or you may learn their ways
and get yourself ensnared.

Saying 4

²⁶ Do not be one who shakes hands in pledge
or puts up security for debts;

²⁷ if you lack the means to pay,
your very bed will be snatched from under you.

1. Fewer Children Living in Poverty

In 2025, the number of poor children around the world was the lowest it has ever been. Thanks to new government help and global support, millions of children got food, homes, and a chance to go to school. This shows that when countries work together, big problems can be solved.

2. Cancer Vaccine Shows Big Success

Doctors and scientists created a new cancer vaccine that did well in the final stage of testing. This vaccine can help protect people from many kinds of cancer. It gave hope to millions, and it may be available to the public starting in 2026.

3. Huge Coral Reef Restored in the Ocean

A large team of ocean experts finished fixing the biggest coral reef restoration project in the world. They brought back more than 500 hectares of coral using smart science and care. This is a big win for the planet and ocean life.

4. Two Countries Sign Peace Deal

Two countries that had been fighting for many years finally signed a peace agreement in 2025. With help from other countries, they agreed to stop fighting and start working together. This shows that peace is possible, even after many years of conflict.

5. Clean Energy Grows in Poorer Countries

Solar, wind, and waterpower became much more common in **developing countries** in 2025. With money and help from other countries, these cleaner energy options are now easier to use. This helps the environment and helps people live better lives.

6. New Hope for Alzheimer's Patients

Scientists made a new drug in 2025 that helps people with early Alzheimer's disease. It doesn't cure the disease, but it helps slow it down and improves memory. This gives **families** more time and support to care for their loved ones.

7. Young People Change Climate Policy

Young people around the world worked hard to get governments to take better care of the planet. Their protests, events, and clean-up drives made a big difference. Many countries listened to and changed their climate laws in 2025.

8. Biggest Animal Rescue Ever

In early 2025, animal groups from around the world worked together to save over **7,000 animals** from illegal trade. Many of these animals were in danger of dying. Now, they live safely in protected wildlife centers.

Sunday School is taking a short break, but Church is still on! Enjoy that extra hour of sleep and join us for worship. We'll share an update soon about when Sunday School will resume.









The Bible presents laughter as a gift from God, emphasizing its role in joy and celebration.


